

From Mega-Events to Sustainable Destinations: A Decade Scoping Review of Sport Event Legacies

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ABSTRACT

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The organization of sporting events is no longer judged solely by operational success during the competition itself, but also by the long-term legacy left for the host. This scoping review aims to map and synthesize the most highly cited literature over the past decade (2017–2026). The study adopted the PRISMA protocol and ten articles with the highest number of citations in the SCOPUS database (representing one top article for each year) were extracted and analyzed thematically. The findings indicate a fundamental paradigm shift, from a focus on physical infrastructure development toward the development of intangible legacies. Key findings highlight that small-scale sports events (minor events) are often more effective in fostering social cohesion and sustainable tourism than mega-events. Furthermore, the integration of a sports event portfolio and responsive risk management has proven to be a critical factor in maintaining tourist loyalty and destination reputation amid global uncertainty. This study concludes that meaningful tourism legacies can only be achieved through policies that align long-term goals with the empowerment of local communities. Through this, the resulting synergy will serve as a strategic roadmap for practitioners and academics in designing future-oriented sports events.

INTRODUCTION

Nowadays, hosting large-scale sporting events cannot be viewed merely as a competitive spectacle (Alshikhy et al., 2025). In recent years, the global paradigm has shifted, and organizers' primary focus lies on what remains after the athletes and spectators have left (Xu & Sato, 2025). This phenomenon extends to a deeper level, how a region can transform itself into a socially and economically resilient destination (Vegara-Ferri et al., 2020; Zhang et al., 2020).

Demands regarding the sustainability of sports competitions have forced organizers to think more deeply. The public is now more critical of massive (state-led) projects that often leave a financial burden on local residents (Duan et al., 2020). In the context of tourism, the challenge lies in whether competition management can create a positive destination image without sacrificing local resources (Avloniti et al., 2025). This makes it crucial for sports management to begin synergizing with strategies for sustainable tourism destination development (Parra-Camacho et al., 2023).

Developments in the research over the past decade indicate that the dynamics of management research in sports competitions or events have been massive (Conti et al., 2025). Research shows how this field has evolved from the golden age of mega-events to the impact of the global crisis, which has forced the emergence of new innovations (Christodimitropoulou et al., 2025; Gupta & McCarthy, 2021). However, the sheer volume of information creates confusion regarding what is effective and what is not. Research must synthesize these various findings to evaluate the overarching patterns shaping the future of sports tourism.

Therefore, this study aims to synthesize ten key articles representing annual research trends over the past decade. The focus is on how sports event management strategies have adapted to create a sustainable tourism legacy. Through this literature review, it is hoped that we will obtain a clear roadmap for sports practitioners in designing sports events that are not only visually spectacular but also meaningful for the future sustainability of destinations (Brennan et al., 2025).

METHODS

This study employs a scoping review design to map the development of the literature on sports event management and tourism legacy. This design allows the researcher to identify various types of studies conducted over the past decade. To ensure the transparency and integrity of the selection process, this study follows the PRISMA (Preferred Reporting Items for Systematic Reviews and Meta-Analyses) flowchart.

Procedure

A literature search was conducted using the SCOPUS database to identify articles of international standard quality. The keywords used in the search process were ("*sport* event**" OR "*mega-event**" OR "*mega event**" AND "*management*" OR "*organize**" OR "*plan**" AND "*legacy*" OR "*tourism impact**" OR "*destination*"), and data collection was conducted on March 29, 2026. The established inclusion criteria are research documents published as articles between 2017 and 2026 and written in English. Additionally, to support the synthesis process, 10 articles with the highest number of citations (one article per year) were selected. The exclusion criteria are documents not published as articles between 2017 and 2026 and not written in English.

The screening results will yield a final set of 10 research articles with the highest number of citations and relevant to this study's topic. Subsequently, these articles will be comprehensively reviewed by two researchers. The review process will be conducted independently, mapping out the study's objectives, sample, design, and results. The findings from this review will be analyzed and synthesized in accordance with the objectives of this study.

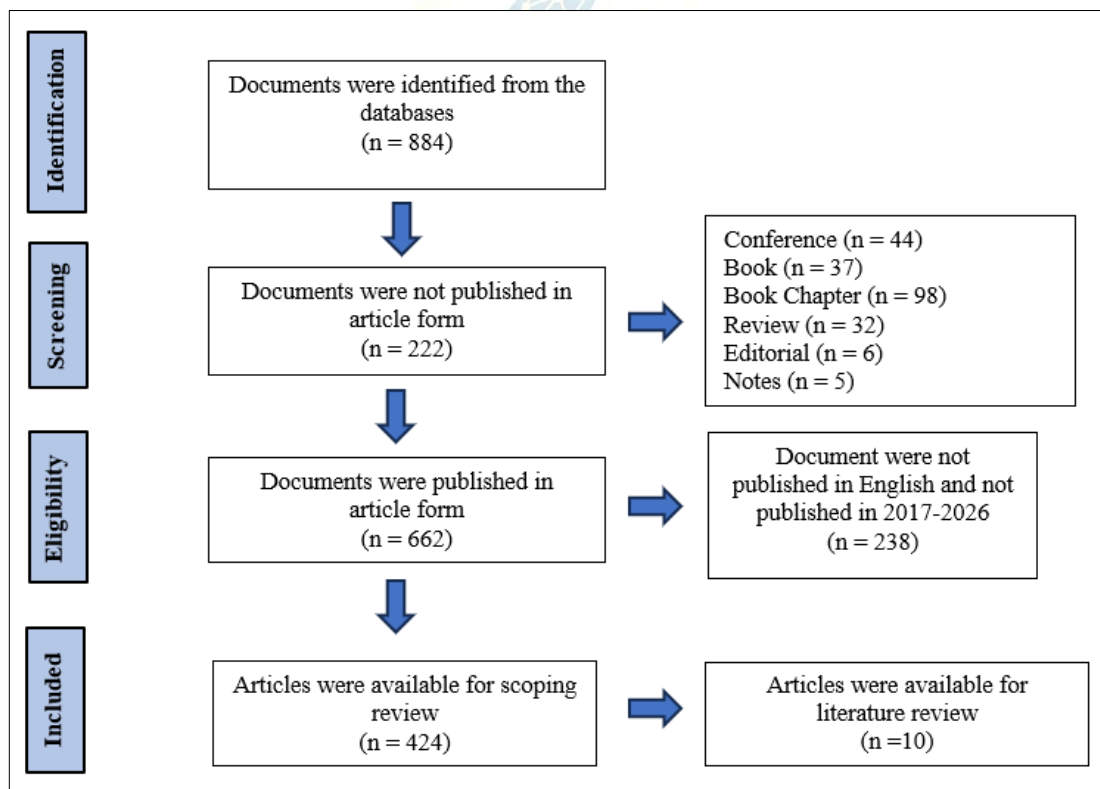


Figure 1. PRISMA flowchart

RESULTS

Based on the results of the mapping conducted in accordance with research procedures, the 10 articles with the highest number of citations for each year were identified. Research focus over the past decade has demonstrated a diversity of methodologies, ranging from qualitative studies with in-depth analysis and bibliometric analysis to large-scale quantitative survey approaches. The context of the sporting events studied also varies, ranging from mega-events such as the Olympics and the Asian Games to smaller-scale sporting events such as local marathons.

From Physical Legacy to Social Legacy

Sports management has undergone a significant paradigm shift, moving from a focus on physical infrastructure development toward the development of social capital and the well-being of local communities. Research conducted by Malchrowicz-Moško & Poczta (2018) demonstrates that small-scale sporting events (minor events) are often more effective in fostering a sense of pride among residents and strengthening social bonds than large-scale sporting events. This is also consistent with research by Schnitzer & Haizinger (2019) and Jiménez-García et al. (2020), which notes that the objectives of future Olympic Games are beginning to limit infrastructure funding. These objectives are being redirected toward long-term goals and a stronger commitment to the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), with a focus on research into the quality of life of local residents as the primary indicator of success.

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Management Resilience and Crisis Mitigation Strategies

The global crisis has demonstrated that the sustainability of tourism legacy depends on risk management capabilities. Recent literature by Morgan et al. (2021) demonstrates that the reputation of destinations and events can be maintained through rapid responses from organizers who manage risks, particularly in addressing sentiment on social media. Furthermore, the implementation of strict health regulations, such as the bubble system described in the study by Dergaa et al. (2022), has become a crucial operational standard to ensure that mega-events can be held safely for all participants.

Synergy Between Destination Image and Tourism Loyalty

Destination reputation management in sports events is now recognized as a key driver of tourist loyalty. Findings from the literature by An & Yamashita (2024) confirm that positive attitudes toward an event are directly correlated with destination image, which ultimately impacts dual loyalty toward both the event and the destination. On the other hand, Öğretmenoğlu et al. (2025) suggest that tourist satisfaction acts as a crucial mediator between their initial motivation to travel and their behavioral intention to revisit the destination in the future (revisit intention).

Policy Integration through Portfolios and Stakeholder

The full impact of a sporting event cannot be achieved if it is managed in isolation without involving the surrounding community. Chalip et al. (2017) note that efforts to increase local-level sports participation require strategic collaboration between organizers and various stakeholders. In terms of policy generalization, according to Ziakas (2023), hosts need to optimize their sports event portfolios by synergizing culture and business with the aim of reducing seasonal tourism. Additionally, multi-sport events can be conceptualized as integrated instruments to drive regional progress, strengthen diplomatic networks, and achieve regional development outcomes.

DISCUSSION

A review of the most-cited literature from 2017 to 2026 confirms a significant theoretical evolution in sports event management and its impact on tourism. The ten articles analyzed collectively demonstrate that the success of a sports event is not measured solely by the grandeur of its infrastructure and short-term profitability. Sports events now focus on creating an intangible legacy rooted in social sustainability, resilience, and integrated portfolio strategies.

Findings regarding the effectiveness of small-scale sports events (minor events) directly challenge traditional assumptions. These assumptions have long prioritized mega-events as the primary drivers of tourism. In fact, community-organized sports events are capable of generating superior social cohesion and sustainable tourism (Malchrowicz-Moško & Poczta, 2018). This indicates that the social engagement of local residents serves as a more stable foundation for a destination's image than merely promoting the event through global media (Jia et al., 2025). This shift is further reinforced by the future Olympic agenda, which prioritizes alignment with urban planning and the city's long-term goals, and places greater emphasis on the principles of the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) (Campillo-Sánchez et al., 2025).

In addition to greater attention to the SDGs, research dynamics over the past decade highlight how vulnerable the image of sports events and tourism is to global crises and public sentiment (Morgan et al., 2021). Findings regarding risk management and the implementation of the "bubble system" confirm that the core competencies of modern event organizers no longer lie solely in material management but also in communication and public assurance (Dergaa et al., 2022). A destination's reputation is highly sensitive to issue management (Zhou

et al., 2023). Swift and transparent mitigation responses have proven effective in protecting a tourist destination's image during sports events (Duan & Wu, 2024).

The implications of this research illustrate a shift in how tourism policymakers operate. Destination image acts as a critical bridge between sports events and tourist loyalty. Therefore, promotional strategies cannot be implemented in isolation. Organizers must build a portfolio of sports events that synergizes sports, cultural, and business assets to ensure a consistent flow of tourists throughout the year. Additionally, formulating an appropriate portfolio will position these sports events as tools for regional diplomacy. Tourist satisfaction must be managed holistically, as it is the most crucial mediator for ensuring repeat visits (revisit intention).

This study has several limitations in its research process. Selecting only the 10 most highly cited articles (one for each year) provides an overview of the most dominant literature but risks overlooking newer articles that have not yet accumulated many citations. Furthermore, the use of a single database SCOPUS, means other documents examining the dynamics of sports event management at the local level may exist. Future research is recommended to expand the scope of the database and empirically explore a comparative analysis of sustainability metrics between mega-events and minor events on a large and expansive scale.

CONCLUSION

An in-depth review of the 10 most-cited articles over the past decade (2017–2026) reveals that sports event management has entered a new era that is far more conscious of long-term impacts. The synthesis of these ten articles confirms that the success of a sports event is no longer measured solely by its fleeting excitement or grandeur. Such success can be derived from the depth of the intangible legacy it leaves behind. Furthermore, the current focus in sports event management places greater value on small-scale events rooted in the community and integrated with various stakeholders, thereby fostering an atmosphere that prioritizes long-term sustainability (SDGs).

This study concludes that a strong tourism legacy is created when sports event management can synergize with various sectors, such as the government, industry, and local communities. Destination image has proven to be an emotional bridge that transforms the viewing experience into visitor loyalty. Innovations in risk management and regional diplomacy further strengthen the position of sports events as strategic instruments for regional development. By understanding the roadmap that has taken shape over the past decade, event organizers and policymakers are expected to design sports events that not only inspire on the field but also provide opportunities for the development of the industry's economic aspects and the harmonization of surrounding communities in the future.
